

COVID-19 Prevention and Mitigation Policies for Summer 2021

These policies are dictated by guidance from the New Jersey Department of Health and Rutgers University. As summer approaches and that guidance evolves, the below policies may be updated or amended.

Campers must arrive to 4-H Camp with proof of a negative PCR test taken within the previous three days. This can be facilitated through 4-H Camp and Diligent Urgent Care (supported through the campers health insurance) or through the campers' own healthcare providers. After the test, campers are expected to follow CDC recommendations and limit contacts and exposure as much as possible Pre-Camp.

Upon arrival, campers will also undergo a health screening and rapid test conducted by Diligent Urgent Care supported by the campers' insurance. Parents must remain in cars for car side drop-off. Campers showing any symptoms or illness before arrival are required to stay home.

Campers will be assigned to a cabin pod for their session. In addition to living in the cabin with this group, the cabin pod will also eat meals together and engage in any activities where outdoor social distance can't be guaranteed.

Masks will be worn anytime that campers in separate cabin pods are mingling with each other and significant outdoor distance can not be assured.

The goal of the above precautions is to lower and control the risk of infection and transmission as much as possible. Of course, no combination of policies can remove risk at Camp entirely.
