Our staff always look for the opportunity to tailor our 4-H Camp program to the needs of each individual camper, and when possible to move the program toward the camper instead of the other way around.

4-H Camp operates under Rutgers University's policies of Diversity and Inclusion and follows the University's dedication to building a beloved community. President Jonathan Holloway describes a beloved community, as one in which all members are working together and are heard, respected, and valued. Inclusion refers to creating environments where individuals and groups feel welcomed, supported, respected and valued by eliminating practices and behaviors that marginalize. At 4-H Camp, cabins are assigned based on both age and by gender, as selected on the Registration Form filled out by the camper's parent/guardian. The cabins are constantly supervised areas of camp, and campers are never in the cabin without a counselor present. Within the cabin and 4-H Camp as a whole, our staff strive to ensure that campers are called by the name they wish to be called, referred to as they like to be referred, and in general treated as they wish to be treated. A gender neutral restroom/shower is available to any camper who wishes to utilize it.
